Veg Guru Tip 3

"Leave your tomatoes in their pots until they flower, then prune the lower suckers and plant deep in well-prepared soil. This ensures good root development, enabling the tomatoes to draw up more water and nutrients from the soil." Jonathan Murphy - Yellow Box Growers



Veg Guru Tip 4

"Try to have wind breaks surrounding your veggie garden. The wind can be damaging and desiccating, stunting the growth of your precious produce. The best kind of wind break still allows a small amount of wind to pass through, like a shade cloth fence or a natural wind break that cools and humidifies the air as the wind passes through, like a hedge of trees or a vine on a trellis. If you choose your natural wind break species wisely it could have multiple functions, providing shade, attracting pollinators and predatory insects and decreasing evaporation and water usage in your veggie garden."

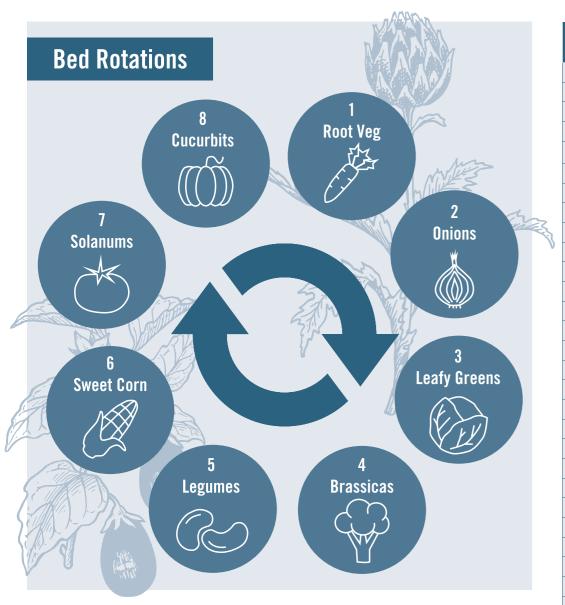


Veg Guru Tip 1
